## SPOTLIGHT ON OUR COMMITTEES

The <u>Resources</u> committee oversees the school's spending and compares the amount spent to the income received from the Kingston borough. It ensures that any large amounts of money which need to be spent, for example on building works and IT infrastructure, can be afforded and are a valuable use of the school savings. Like all schools around the country funding is an increasing concern as we are seeing our income reducing while costs remain the same. We are lucky to have wonderfully supportive parents who continue to contribute to the school fund and also pay for school clubs, swimming lessons and school trips. This allows the school to continue to offer a wide range of extra



opportunities for the children while the school budget can be focused on providing the core curriculum needs. <u>Kathryn Moore</u>

The <u>Children, Community and Safeguarding</u> committee has had a productive year. In January we conducted a thorough internal audit looking very carefully at all of our policies and procedures in ensuring the welfare and safety of all children in the school. To follow this up, in March we invited an external auditor to spend a day at the school speaking to Mrs Berry, the teachers, the Governors and the chil-



dren. The report was extremely positive and complimentary. We have created a new Swimming policy to make swimming at school as safe and enjoyable for the children as possible. This has meant looking carefully at how volunteers help and support the children in a safe and trusting way. Time has been spent considering the issues we have relating to road safety in the horseshoe and the surrounding roads. There are ongoing concerns relating to incidents of inconsiderate and dangerous parking and as a committee we continue to look at how to ensure the safety of our children every day as well as how to maintain good relations with local residents

which is essential for our school to thrive as part of the local community. Parents play a key role in helping us to do this. We have recently looked at the attendance and lateness statistics for this year. It is proven that persistent lateness has a real impact on a child's performance at school, as well as being disruptive to their peers and teachers. Ofsted inspections look very closely at attendance and absence statistics and it is genuinely in everyone's interests to have children in school and ready to learn on time in the morning. Steps have been made by the school to address punctuality and we are pleased to see a great improvement in this area. <u>Alison Reid</u>

The <u>Curriculum and Standards</u> committee works with the school to ensure that the SIP (school Improvement Plan) is implemented throughout each year. We look at and analyse all the school's data that includes SATs results, Phonics results, midyear end of year group predictions for each subject and the actual outcome of results. An external School Improvement Partner visits the school once a term and a full report is then submitted to the committee. This year we made visits to the school to view pupil's work and have had presentations from all the lead teachers for Reading, Writing,



Maths, Science, EYFS and Special Educational . The teachers gave a full rundown of any areas that had been highlighted for improvement or expansion and exactly how this was being addressed and implemented into everyday teaching. One of the areas of focus this year has been Mathematics, where a whole new Calculation Policy has been written and implemented to ensure even better cohesion throughout the year groups. <u>Victoria Clayton</u>
