

Pupil Premium Children at Coombe Hill Infants: Analysis over 3 Year Period
2015 - 2017

OUTCOMES:

- In both 2016 and 2017 a very high percentage of children on PPG Register were also on Child Protection/Vulnerable Register and also on SEND Register. These additional barriers to learning caused the PPG children to get lower outcomes than the non-PPG children.
- A more detailed breakdown can be found in the PPG Action Plan 2017-18.
- In 2015, by contrast, the PPG children made excellent progress from their individual starting points and results in reading and writing were very similar to non-PPG children.

PROGRESS:

- All PPG children are closely tracked throughout their time at Coombe Hill Infants. Additional support is given to enable all the children to make good progress and achieve their potential.
- In 2017 PPG children made better progress than in 2016 in all areas. However, progress of the non-PPG children was also higher in all areas, so the gap has widened. It also reflects the nature of this particular cohort, who had a very high level of additional need. See PPG Action plan for further details.
- In 2015, all of the 8 PPG children made expected progress and they outperformed the non-PPG children.
